# Tunney And Winchell Invited To Beaulieu Brick Pouring

Guests from the United States and all parts of Canada have been invited to attend the pouring of the first gold bar at Beaulieu Yellowknife Mines Limited on Sunday, December 7. Notables who have been invited include Gene Tunney, former world's heavyweight champion of Stamford, Conn., who is a Beaulieu shareholder; Walter Winchell of New York, America's leading news commentator; principal officials of the Canadian Department of Mines and Resources; Premier E. C. Manning of Alberta and more than 35 widely known financiers, mining men and magazine and newspaper writers. H. G. Hutchings, president of the mining company, and Sam Ciglen, vice president, both of Toronto, will attend. A. O. Ames, managing director of Beaulieu, is arranging that local mining and business people will have an opportunity to meet the guests during their visit here.

Following the official pouring at Beaulieu a visit by aircraft will be made to Hottah Lake, near Port Radium, where exploration work and diamond drilling is under way on the radioactive ore properties of Gold-Uranium Explorations Limited. Mr. Tunney is vice president of this company.

Beaulieu officials report that the mill is presently treating 60 tons of ore per day and production is being stepped up to a capacity of 90 to 100 tons.

# Re Beaulieu Yellowknife

During the past week disturbing news has reached Yellowknife concerning the operations of Beaulieu Yellowknife Mines Limited.

The News of the North has been informed that A. O. Ames, managing director of the mining company, is no longer in charge of the company's operations following a directors' meeting in Toronto. Indefinite postponement of a brick-pouring party, which Mr. Ames described as being impractical and out of line with development at this time, has been announced. Nearly 40 notables from the United States and Canada had been invited to attend the party, which was scheduled for December 7 and this pouring celebration was reported delayed because the ice at Hansen Lake, near the Beaulieu camp, was declared unsafe for heavy aircraft. Among those invited were Gene Tunney of Stamford, Conn., former world's heavyweight champion, who was scheduled to referee a boxing match in Yellowknife on Decem-

ber 8. Yellowknife residents have since learned from a U.S. publication that at that time Mr. Tunney was either in South America or en route there.

During the past few months, upon recommendation of Mr. Ames, several local consultants have visited the property. The News of The North has been informed. Their reports have not been made public.

The former mining inspector and managing-director of Beaulieu announces plans to open a mining consultant practice in Yellowknife.

While rumors continue to suggest that the Securities Commission of the Province of Ontario may conduct an investigation into the affairs of the mining firm, A. D. Hellens has arrived from the east to take charge for the company and a Beaulieu official advises that the camp "is not closing down or going out of business." About 35 are still employed there and this is about half of the total on the payroll until recently.

Dear Mr. Hutchings:

I was sorry to hear of the delay in getting Beaulieu into production but as I know the property and have been on it several times, I have a lot of confidence in it and have had all along. I am satisfied that there will be many gold bricks come from Beaulieu.

I have a property consisting of 18 claims just west, less than three miles from your air strip, on the East shore of Hearne Lake.

This is one of the largest and strongest geology structures that I have seen in the Yellowknife district. The shear zone is at least 1,000 ft. wide and runs through the property for at least nine claim lengths. There are several parallel quartz veins, well mineralized in the structure.

There is one vein of massive galena on the edge of the water which is at least eight feet wide. Two assays from this vein ran: Sample No. 1, 4.06 gold, 9.64 silver. Sample No. 2, 2.51 gold and 14.19 silver. No visible gold. South about one claim length a five foot vein of quartz with considerable visible gold assays 1.32, 1.37, 5.33, 0.17, 0.30 and 4.29 in gold.

About 1.800 ft. South and 600 ft. East, there is a quartz vein about thirty feet wide containing massive arseno and galena and several other minerals. Three assays from this vein ran 0.10, 0.09 and 0.07. I could only get a pit down a few feet on any of these veins as they lay too close to the water.

If you people are interested I would be glad to mail to you a few samples from the various veins.

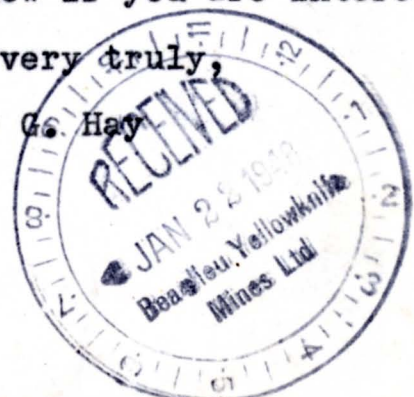

Dear Mr. Hutchings:

Our Mining Recorder at Yellowknife reported some time ago that there were rumours to the effect that your company might be closing down the mine on the "Norma" group of mineral claims owing to certain operating difficulties and arrangements were made to have our mining inspector and the resident geologist visit the property to ascertain the actual situation. These officers spent some three or four days at the mine last month but it would appear from their reports that they were unable to determine whether or not your company intended to continue mining operations.

It is understood that your company has about forty-five employees at the mine, some of whom have their families with them, and the future welfare of these people is a matter of considerable concern to the department. In the circumstances I would appreciate receiving from you a statement of your company's plans and an assurance that in the event of the shutting down of the mine, your company will make the necessary arrangements for the removal of their employees and families and the payment of any wages or salaries which may be owing to the said employees.
